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## DCP/ACRE Sign-Up Deadline June 1, 2012

Enrollment for the 2012 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP) and ACRE will continue through **June 1, 2012**. Please come by the office or if another USDA Service Center is more convenient you may complete the 2012 DCP/ACRE contract at that location. Please remember to bring in any renewed or new leases for rented ground.

## 2010 SURE Sign-Up Deadline June 1, 2012

Sign-up for the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payment (SURE) program for the 2010 crop year began Nov. 14, 2011, and will end on **June 1, 2012**. SURE provides benefits for farm revenue losses due to natural disasters. A farm is eligible when either:

- A portion of the farm is located in a county, or a contiguous county, covered by a qualifying Secretarial disaster declaration.
- An overall loss greater than 50 percent of the actual production on the farm compared to expected production for the farm for that year.

For producers to be eligible for SURE, they must have obtained a policy or plan of insurance for all crops through either the Federal Crop Insurance Act or FSA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP). Producers must suffer a 10 percent production loss due to a natural disaster to at least one crop of economic significance on their farm in order to be eligible for SURE.

## County Committee Nominations

The County Committee nomination period runs from **June 15, 2012** through **August 1, 2012**. The 2012 election is for area #5 which is the area east and south of the Snake River in Jefferson County. The position is currently held by George E. Ellsworth.

The election of agricultural producers to Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees is important to ALL farmers and ranchers. FSA county committees are a link between the agricultural community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

County committee members are a critical component of the operations of FSA. They help deliver FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers and ranchers who serve on county committees help with the decisions necessary to administer the programs in their counties.

They work to ensure FSA agricultural programs serve the needs of local producers.

FSA county committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws. County committee members apply their judgment and knowledge to make local decisions

### Election Period

June 15, 2012 – COC nomination period begins.

Aug. 1, 2012 – COC nomination forms (FSA-669A) due at the local USDA Service Center.

Nov. 5, 2012-COC ballots mailed to eligible voters.

Dec. 3, 2012- Last day to return completed COC ballots to the USDA Service Center.

Jan.1, 2013- Newly elected COC members take office.

## New Crop Reporting Deadline- Spring Seeded July 15<sup>th</sup>

The annual, timely and accurate reporting of acres for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage, can prevent loss of benefits for a variety of Farm Service Agency programs. All cropland on the farm must be reported to receive benefits from the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program, marketing assistance loans and Loan Deficiency Payments.

Conservation Reserve Program acreage must be reported to receive annual rental payments. Crop acreage for Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) also must be reported.

Crop reports must account for all cropland on a farm, whether idle or planted. Producers need to file their acreage reports by **June 30<sup>th</sup>** for fall seeded crops and by **July 15<sup>th</sup>** for spring seeded crops.

### **Prevented Planting:**

Prevented planting needs to be reported no later than **15 calendar days** after the final planting date.

### **Failed Acreage:**

Reports of failed acreage must be filed before disposition of the crop, and producers must be able to establish to the satisfaction of the county committee that the crop failed and was prevented from being replanted through the normal planting period because of natural disaster conditions.

## **NAP Records**

Production records for individual crops need to be filed at the FSA office to establish an approved NAP yield. If this is the first year you participated in NAP, you can provide production and acreage information from prior years to establish your yield. If you participated in NAP in previous years, you must report your production and acreage on a yearly basis to keep your yield up-to-date. Records submitted must be reliable or verifiable. Records need to show crop disposition. We recommend producers submit production records as soon as harvest is complete. All prior year production records must be submitted by **July 15<sup>th</sup>, 2012**.

## **NAP Loss Filing**

The CCC-576, Notice of Loss, is used to report failed acreage and prevented planting and may be completed by any producer with an interest in the crop. Timely filing a Notice of Loss is required for all crops including grasses. For losses on crops covered by the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and crop insurance, you must file a CCC-576, Notice of Loss, in the FSA County Office within 15 days of the occurrence of the disaster or when losses become apparent.

If filing for prevented planting, an acreage report and CCC-576 must be filed within 15 calendar days of the final planting date for the crop.

## **Conservation Reserve Program**

Participants in the CRP program are reminded that the Primary Nesting Season is April 1 to August 1. Spot spraying for weed control is the only activity that can be done on CRP acres during this time frame. Please contact the office if you have any questions.

## **NOTICE TO HISPANIC AND/OR WOMEN FARMERS OR RANCHERS**

### **COMPENSATION FOR CLAIMS OF DISCRIMINATION**

If you believe that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) improperly denied farm loan benefits to you between 1981 and 2000 because you are Hispanic, or because you are female, you may be eligible to apply for compensation.

## Farm Loan Programs

The Farm Service Agency is committed to providing family farmers with loans to meet their farm credit needs. Those producers who are having trouble getting credit for their farm or who regularly borrow from FSA, direct and guaranteed loans are currently available.

Ask a lender about an FSA loan guarantee to help with a setback or if a lender has been reluctant to extend or renew a loan.

Farm ownership loans or farm operating loans may be obtained as direct loans for a maximum of up to \$300,000. Guaranteed loans have a maximum limit of \$1,214,000. This makes the maximum combination of direct and guaranteed loan indebtedness \$1,514,000.

## Farm Reconstitutions

At FSA, farms are “constituted” to group all tracts having the same owner and the same operator under one farm serial number. When changes in ownership or operation take place, a farm reconstitution is necessary. If an owner or operator cannot agree about program participation, like in the case of the new ACRE program, then producers should inquire about a reconstitution of the farm at the local FSA office.

The reconstitution — or recon — is the process of combining or dividing farms or tracts of land based on the farming operation. Remember, to be effective for the current year, recons must be requested by **Aug. 1, 2012**, for farms enrolled in specific programs.

## Succession in Interest for 2012 DCP/ACRE

If you have made any changes that affect your interest in base acres since you signed your last DCP/ACRE contract, you must report these *successions-in-interest* to the county committee by **Sept. 30<sup>th</sup>**. Changes that qualify as a succession-in-interest include:

- A sale of land
- A change of operator or producer, including an increase or decrease in the number of partners
- A foreclosure, bankruptcy or involuntary loss of the farm.
- A change in producer shares to reflect changes in the producer's share of the crop(s) that were originally approved on the contract.

If a succession-in-interest takes place and is not timely reported and a new contract signed prior to September 30, neither the original contract nor the resulting contract are eligible for payment. The contract would be terminated resulting in a loss of program benefits for all producers involved.

## March MILC Payments

FSA's Milk Income Loss Contract Program (MILC) compensates dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level. MILC payments are made when the Boston Class I milk price falls below \$16.94 per hundredweight (cwt) as adjusted by the dairy feed ration adjustment. The monthly Boston price is posted online at:

Eligible producers should submit the current MILC (Milk Income Loss Contract) statements for payment. Eligibility for 2012 must be completed before payments can be disbursed. Please contact the office to check the status of your eligibility.
