COC ELECTION RESULTS

Congratulations to Jack Jeppesen for being newly elected to the Montcalm County FSA Committee as representative of LAA-2.

John Black was elected as first alternate of LAA-2. Thank you for your interest in serving the FSA community of Montcalm County.

Thank you to Eugene Rentschler for his 9 years of dedication to the Montcalm County FSA Committee. Eugene was ineligible for nomination due to a term limit restriction.

Important New Requirement

Farm Service Agency is partnering with the Internal Revenue Service to reduce fraud in farm programs and streamlining payment limits for family farmers.

To retain 2009 and earn 2010 program benefits a new form must be filed directly with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS)

All entities must submit form CCC-928. Individuals and members of entities must submit form CCC-927. Forms are available in our office. Our office does not submit or maintain completed forms.

The deadline for filing these forms is 60 days from the signature date requesting benefits not to exceed June 15th each year.

This is to ensure that payments are not issued to producers whose AGI exceeds certain limits. The limits set in the 2008 Farm Bill are \$500,000 nonfarm Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) for commodity and disaster programs; \$750,000 farm average AGI for direct payments; and \$1 million nonfarm average AGI for conservation programs.

Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP)

March 15 is the application closing date for most 2010 spring planted annual crops. Producers who had coverage on 2009 NAP crops may choose to continue coverage on the same crop or crops for 2010, if the applicable service fee is submitted by the application closing date. If you have a policy on NAP crops and have not turned in your production, please do so before July 15, 2010. This is a requirement of the NAP program and will help establish a more accurate historical yield. To remain compliant in NAP, producers must: (1) file acreage reports by July 15, 2010, (2) follow HEL and Wetland conservation compliance requirements, (3) file Notice of Loss within 15 days of weather damage or within 15 days of the loss becoming apparent to the producer, (4) request loss adjustment appraisals if any crop will not be harvested or to document production left in the field, and 5) provide true and complete production records for the unit.

COC Meetings & Minutes

Dates of meetings and regular session minutes are posted in the office. Meetings are held at the Montcalm FSA Office on the 2nd Thursday of each month at 8:30 am. Meetings are re-scheduled from time to time so please call in advance to confirm meeting dates and time.



ACRE Program

Producers have the option to participate in a state-level revenue protection program instead of the counter/cyclical (CC). The program is per farm number, the same as DCP. Only farms with previously established bases are eligible. ACRE election is optional and can be made in any of the next 3 years. Once the election is made the farmland will stay in the program. Producers who choose to participate in ACRE will:

1. Not receive a CC payment on enrolled farms.
2. Have a 20 percent reduction in direct payments on enrolled farms.
3. Have a 30 percent reduction in marketing assistance loan rates on enrolled farms.
4. Have a 20 percent reduction in the maximum payment limit for DCP.

ACRE payments are made only if two triggers are met. First, state per acre revenue must be less than the state guarantee. Second, a producer must have an actual revenue loss for the crop on the farm. If the triggers are met, the producer will receive an ACRE payment.

The payment is equal to the difference between the state per acre revenue guarantee and the state actual revenue calculation, times 83.3 percent (85 percent for 2012) of the acres planted on the farm or total base acres of the farm, which ever is less; times the 5 year farm yield Olympic average divided by the 5 year state Olympic average.

NOTE

Production reporting to establish 2009 Olympic average of farm crop production is due by June 30th for fall seeded crops and July 15th for spring seeded crops. 2004-2009 yields are needed.

Maintaining CRP Cover

CRP cover maintenance is the participant's responsibility and must be done according to the conservation plan.

All CRP maintenance activity, such as mowing, burning and spraying, must be conducted outside the primary nesting season for wildlife and in accordance with the Conservation plan. The ending date for the primary nesting season for wildlife in Michigan is August 1st.

Farm Loan Programs

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) can make and guarantee loans to socially disadvantaged applicants to buy and operate family size farms and ranches. Funds specifically for these loans are reserved each year.

A socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher is one of a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of the group without regard to their individual qualities. For purposes of this program, socially disadvantaged groups are women, African Americans, American Indians and Alaskan Natives, Hispanics, and Asians and Pacific Islanders. Farm Reconstitutions

In FSA program terminology, farms are *constituted* to group all tracts having the same owner and or the same operator under one farm serial number. When changes in ownership or operation take place, a farm *reconstitution* is necessary.

(DCP) & (ACRE) for 2010

ACT NOW!!

The sign-up for the 2010 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP) & the ACRE program has a deadline of June 1st.

Advance payments of 22% may be made for the 2010 program in any month you select, beginning with December; the final payment will be made in October. After June 1, our office will charge a \$100.00 late fee per farm to participate.

Farms having base acres of 10.0 acres or less cannot be approved for payment.


The exception is farms 50% owned by:

1. **Socially Disadvantaged (SDA)**
2. **Limited Resource Farmer**

2008 Disaster Assistance Program

• Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) Program

Sign-up for the 2008 SURE Program has begun and is available to eligible producers that meet the following requirements:

Has obtained at least the minimum level of insurance under SURE, a producer **must have** a plan of insurance for 2008 with not less than 50 percent yield coverage at 55 percent of the insurable price for each crop grazed, planted, or intended to be planted for harvest on a whole farm.

- **All insurable crops** on the farm (this includes hay), a policy or plan of insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act
- Noninsurable Assistance Program (NAP) commodity(s) on the farm.
- According to Pub. L 110-398, at the option of an eligible producer on a farm, the producer may elect to waive insurance or NAP coverage on a crop **that is determined not to be economically significant: (De Minimis)**

Economic significance means any crop that contributed, or is expected to contribute, 5 percent or more of the total expected value of all crops grown by the producer.

(Or)

For which the NAP fee exceeds 10 percent of the value of NAP coverage.

Note: De Minimis only applies to SURE. If the producer elects to designate a crop as a De Minimis crop, the producer is **no** longer eligible for ELAP or TAP. Also, the crop will **not** have a SURE guarantee and revenue calculated.

BIOMASS CROP ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (BCAP)

The Biomass Crop Assistance Program (BCAP) was authorized by Title IX of the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002, as amended by Title IX of the Food, Conservation, and Energy of 2008 Act (2008 Farm Bill). BCAP:

- assists agricultural and forest land owners and operators with matching payments for the amount paid for the collection, harvest, storage and transportation (CHST) of eligible material by a qualified Biomass Conversion Facility (BCF).
- supports establishing and producing eligible crops for the conversion to bioenergy through project areas and on contract acreage up to 5 years for annual and non-woody perennial crops.

The CHST Matching Payment Program will provide eligible material owners matching payments for the sale and delivery of eligible material to a CHST-qualified BCF. These payments will be available to eligible material owners at the rate of \$1 for each \$1 per dry ton paid by the CHST-qualified BCF to the eligible material owners, limited to a maximum of \$45 per dry ton and limited to a 2-year payment duration.

Foreign Buyers Notification

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) requires all foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land to report their holdings to the Secretary of Agriculture. The Farm Service Agency administers this program for USDA.

All individuals who are not U.S. citizens, and have purchased or sold agricultural land in the county are required to report the transaction to FSA with 90 days of the closing. Failure to submit the AFIDA form (FSA-153) could result in civil penalties of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the property. County government offices, Realtors, attorneys and others involved in real estate transactions are reminded to notify foreign investors of these reporting requirements.

Controlled Substance

Any person who is convicted under federal or state law of a controlled substance violation could be ineligible for USDA payments or benefits. Violations include planting, harvesting or growing a prohibited plant. Prohibited plants include marijuana, opium, poppies and other drug producing plants.

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Wetland Compliance

If you plan on clearing, draining, dredging or tile maintenance of any kind, you need to file an AD-1026 with our office before you begin. Failure to do so could result in the loss of USDA benefits.

Sodbuster Regulations

The term “sodbusting” is used to identify the plowing up of erosion-prone grasslands for use as cropland. Sodbuster violations are unauthorized tillage practices on highly erodible lands that converted native vegetation such as rangeland or woodland, to crop production after Dec. 23, 1985.

Farmers and ranchers should be aware that if they use highly erodible land for crop production without proper conservation measures, they risk losing eligibility to participate in Farm Service Agency programs.

Before producers clear, plow or otherwise prepare areas not presently under crop production for planting, they are required to file an AD-1026, indicating the area to be brought into production.

If Natural Resources Conservation Service indicates on a CPA-026 that the area will be highly erodible land, the producer will be required to develop and implement a conservation plan on the affected acreage, before bringing land into production.

Preventing Fraud

The Farm Service Agency has joined with the Risk Management Agency to prevent fraud, waste and abuse in the Federal Crop Insurance Program. FSA has been, and will continue to, assist RMA and insurance providers by monitoring crop conditions throughout the growing season. In addition, FSA will refer all suspected cases of fraud, waste and abuse to RMA. Producers can report suspected cases to the county office staff, RMA office, or the Office of the Inspector General.
