

FSA At Work Across Kentucky - FY 2010



The USDA Farm Service Agency delivered over \$265 million in federal program payments to Kentucky farmers and ranchers during FY 2010. Kentucky agriculture benefits greatly from the tireless efforts of our dedicated employees and locally elected County Committees.

Commodity Program Payments: \$307.9 million

Kentucky producers benefited from commodity and price support program payments during FY 2010.

\$48,505,811 - Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP)- Direct payments provide income support to producers of eligible commodities based on production history.

\$2,004,551 - Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) and \$3,157,423 in Dairy Economic Loss Assistance - Provides compensation to dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

\$7,864,897 - Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE) - provides producers a revenue based payment as an alternative to price based counter-cyclical payments.

\$155,581,109 - Tobacco Transition Program Payments (TTPP)- provides annual transitional payments for 10 years to eligible tobacco quota holders and producers. Payments began in 2005 and continue through

2014. Payments are funded through assessments of approximately \$10 billion on tobacco product manufacturers and importers.



Conservation: \$65 million

FSA continues to make strides toward conserving and improving soil, water, and wildlife resources in Kentucky. The Conservation Reserve Program is the USDA's single largest, most effective environmental program. Conservation investments for Kentucky in FY 2010 include:

\$43,884,319- Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)- Provides financial incentives, cost-share and rental payments to producers who convert highly erodible cropland or environmentally sensitive acreage to long-term vegetative cover.

\$20,135,435 - Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)- Provides emergency funding for farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate farmland damaged by natural disasters and to carry out emergency water conservation measures during periods of severe drought.

\$1,045,843 - Biomass Crop Assistance Program (BCAP) - assists land owners and operators with the collection, harvest, storage and transportation of eligible material used in a biomass conversion facility.

\$19,501 - Grassland Reserve Program (GRP) - is a voluntary program designed to protect grasslands from conversion to cropland. Producer rental payments provide an incentive to maintain pastures for grazing.



Disaster Assistance: \$28.9 million

From drought to food, freeze to tornadoes and hurricanes - no production agriculture operation is immune to the effects of natural disasters. Kentucky FSA was financially responsive to the state's producers.

\$10,187,083 - Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) - provides payments to producers when farm revenue losses are due to natural disasters.

\$317,394 - Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) - The NAP program provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters.

\$50,326 - Tree Assistance Program (TAP) - provides assistance to qualifying orchardist and nursery tree growers for losses from a natural disaster.

\$8,804,832 - The Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) - Provided Kentucky livestock producers with financial assistance.

\$6,412,759 - Livestock Forage Program (LFP) - provides financial assistance to producers who suffer grazing losses

Farm Loans: \$124,278,000

FSA obligated \$124,278,000 in direct and guaranteed operating loans, farm ownership loans, emergency loans, youth loans, socially disadvantaged loans, and loans to beginning farmers.

\$58,558,000 - Guaranteed Loans - FSA guarantees loans made by conventional agricultural lenders. In FY 2010, FSA in Kentucky guaranteed 276 farm ownership and farm operating loans.

\$65,720,000 - Direct Loans - FSA provides assistance to those unable to obtain guaranteed loans. In FY 2010, FSA in Kentucky funded 1366 farm ownership and farm operating loans.

\$988,460 - Youth Loan - In FY 2010, Kentucky funded 252 youth loans.

\$51,025,000 - Beginning Farmer Loans - In FY 2010, 699 beginning farmer loans were made in Kentucky.

\$11,345,000 - Socially Disadvantaged Loans - In FY 2010, 225 loans for socially disadvantaged producers were made in Kentucky.
