Commodity Loan and Program Payments: \$227 million

Kentucky producers received substantial monetary support during FY 2013 in the form of commodity and price support program payments.

\$42,691,471 - Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) Direct payments provide income support to producers of eligible commodities based on production history.

\$2,987,894 - Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) provides compensation to dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

\$152,333,702 - Tobacco Transition Program Payments (TTPP) provides annual transitional payments for 10 years to eligible tobacco quota holders and producers. Payments began in 2005 and continue through 2014. Payments are funded through assessments of approximately \$10 billion on tobacco product manufacturers and importers.

\$8,290,475 - Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE) provides producers a revenue based payment as an alternative to price based counter-cyclical payments.

\$16,585,877 - Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL) provide producers interim financing at harvest time to meet cash flow needs without having to sell their commodities when market prices are typically at harvest-time lows.

\$3,746,543 - Farm Storage Facility Loans (FSFL) - Under the Commodity Credit Corporate (CCC) Charter Act, FSA may make loans to producers to build or upgrade farm storage and handling facilities for eligible commodities.

Conservation: \$44.8 million

FSA made significant investments toward conserving and improving soil, water, and wildlife resources in Kentucky. The Conservation Reserve Program is the USDA's single largest, most effective environmental program. Conservation investments in FY 2013 include:

\$42,925,231- Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)- Provides financial incentives, cost-share and rental payments to producers who convert highly erodible cropland or environmentally sensitive acreage to long-term vegetative cover. Kentucky has **17,535** CRP contacts protecting **296,879.4** acres.

\$1,041,765- Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)- Provides emergency funding for farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate farmland damaged by natural disasters and to carry out emergency water conservation measures during periods of severe drought.

\$805,139 - Grassland Reserve Program (GRP)- is a voluntary program designed to protect grasslands from conversion to cropland. Producer rental payments provide an incentive to maintain pastures for grazing.



Disaster Assistance: \$8.163 million

From flood, freeze and tornadoes - FSA was financially responsive to Kentucky producers following natural disasters.

\$7,553,563 - Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) - Provides payments to producers when farm revenue losses are due to natural disasters.

\$534,375 - Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) - The NAP program provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory, or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters.

\$66,619 - Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP)- Provided Kentucky livestock producers with financial assistance.

\$8,000 - Trade Adjustment Assistance



Farm Loans: \$134,714,067

FSA offers various loan options to Kentucky farmers and ranchers who manage family-sized operations and who were temporarily unable to obtain private or commercial credit. Kentucky ranked in the top ten in loans made for the seventh consecutive year.

\$67,742,000 - Guaranteed Loans - FSA guarantees loans made by conventional agricultural lenders. In FY 2013, Kentucky FSA guaranteed 280 farm ownership and farm operating loans.

\$66,144,000 - Direct Loans - FSA provides assistance to those unable to obtain guaranteed loans. In FY 2013, Kentucky FSA funded 1462 farm ownership and farm operating loans.

\$963,670 - Youth Loans - In FY 2013, Kentucky funded 263 youth loans.

\$63,689,304 - Beginning Farmer Loans - In FY 2013, 832 beginning farmer loans were made in Kentucky.

\$13,267,818 - Socially Disadvantaged Loans - In FY 2013, 301 loans for socially disadvantaged producers were made in Kentucky.
